This three-day conference will blend Tribal Nations, institutional and individual funders, non-profit organizations, movement leaders, field experts, and practitioners in a space designed for meaningful connection and collaboration. Our program offers rich opportunities for peer learning, community building, knowledge exchange, cultural experiences, engaging plenaries, artistic presentations, and much more. We have designed an experience that honors diverse cultures and heritages while looking toward our collective future.

There are many ways to be part of this gathering, and we hope you will consider investing in this work. Your partnership helps make this space possible and ensures that the connections, conversations, and commitments made in Anchorage continue to strengthen our field long after the conference ends.

ABOUT ALASKA

America's northernmost state is home to the largest population of Native peoples in the country. For thousands of years, Alaska Natives have lived and thrived amidst some of the harshest environments through subsistence lifestyles of hunting, fishing, and gathering. Today, the size and rural character of much of the state present a diversity of traditions and cultures—each distinct and worthy of celebration.

Representing over 19% of the state's population, Alaska Natives hold a government-to-government relationship with the United States. The state boasts a diverse Native landscape with 229 Tribal Governments and 11 distinct geographic cultures: Eyak, Tlingit, Haida, Tsimshian peoples in the Southeast; Inupiaq and St. Lawrence Island Yupik in the north and northwest; Yup'ik and Cup'ik Alaska Natives in the southwest; the Athabaskan peoples in the state's interior; and Alutiiq (Sugpiaq) and Unangax peoples in south-central Alaska and the Aleutian Islands.

The October 2025 Typhoon Halong displaced more than one thousand residents and brought Alaska's Native Villages into the national news. These communities continue to respond to the aftermath of the typhoon, which has impacted housing and other critical infrastructure across the state's southwest coast. Although Alaskan Native communities have long experienced natural disasters, threatened environmental conditions, and underinvestment by philanthropy, a number of state, regional, and national organizations have modeled successful partnerships that emphasize self-governance over education. One example is the Alaska Native Health System, which has transformed health outcomes through a ten-year increase in life expectancy and a child immunization rate of over 90%. The 2027 Annual Conference will connect and uplift partners throughout the state who help Native communities thrive.

Individuals, communities, and organizations that represent the state's diverse Native cultures will be highlighted at the conference. The event is being planned with guidance from a local advisory committee that includes Village, Tribal, and Native nonprofit leaders throughout the state. It will include learning tours of areas within and near Anchorage and opportunities to learn directly from those who have made the state a vibrant and culturally significant place.

ABOUT NAP

Native Americans in Philanthropy (NAP) promotes equitable and effective philanthropy in Native communities. We have more than a 30-year presence in the field and work closely with our counterpart organizations advocating for Natives communities. The cornerstone of our work is our relatives and our networks. We support several communities of stakeholders that work together to build knowledge, community, priorities, and power in the sector. These networks include philanthropic professionals, Tribal leaders, youth leaders, philanthropic executives and board members, and non-profit leaders.

YUKON – \$150,000 OR HIGHER

The Yukon River flows approximately 1,980 miles from its source in the Llewellyn Glacier in British Columbia to the Bering Sea. The river is the longest as it runs through Canada's Yukon Territory and Alaska. It holds immense significance for many Alaska Natives as a vital source of subsistence and cultural identity. Efforts to protect the river and ensure its continued use for fishing are crucial for preserving the cultural heritage and food sovereignty of Alaska Natives.

PARTNERSHIP LEVELS

KUSKOKWIM \$75,000

The Kuskokwim River in Southwest Alaska is formed by the confluence of the East Fork Kuskokwim River and the North Fork Kuskokwim River. It runs 702 miles and flows to Kuskokwim Bay and the Bering Sea. The river's waters are central to the subsistence practices of many Alaskan Tribes, particularly by providing salmon as a primary food source.

TANANA \$50,000

The Tanana River is a 584-mile tributary of the Yukon River. Its headwater is located at the confluence of the Nabesna River and Chisan Rivers in eastern Alaska and flows along the northern slopes of the Alaska Range to emerge into the Tanana Valley in Central Alaska. "Tanana" is an Athabascan term meaning "river trail," reflecting its role as a vital waterway for transportation and sustenance. The river's basin was historically inhabited by the Tanana people and provided rich resources including salmon and moose.

PORCUPINE \$25,000

The Porcupine River is a 569-mile tributary of the Yukon River that originates from the Ogilvie Mountains in Yukon, Canada, and flows through the Old Crow community before veering southwest into Alaska, and finally into the larger river at Fort Yukon. The river's name, derived from the Gwich'in language, reflects its natural features and the cultural significance it holds for the indigenous inhabitants. The river connects to the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and plays a role in the migration of the Porcupine caribou herd.

INNOKO \$10,000

The Innoko River is a 500-mile tributary of the Yukon River that flows north from its origin south of Cloudy Mountain in the Kuskokwim Mountains and then southwest to meet the larger river across from Holy Cross. Most of the river's upper portion flows through the Innoko National Wildlife Refuge. The name derives from the Athabaskan peoples, who are the descendants of the original inhabitants of the interior of Alaska.

KOYUKUK \$5,000

The Koyukuk River is the last major tributary entering the Yukon before the larger river empties into the Bering Sea. The 425-mile tributary has headwaters above the Arctic Circle in the Endicott Mountains of the Brooks Range and drains an area north of the Yukon River that includes part of the Gates of the Arctic National Park and Preserve, as well as Kanuti National Wildlife Refuge and Koyukuk National Wildlife Refuge.
